Class 72 Jubilee Top Vase *(for Trophy)*

A vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between 5 and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of 2 different KINDS of plants: 2 varieties of the same plant are NOT 2 kinds. Only fresh HOMEGROWN flowers may be used. Stems used must show flowers only and not berries or seed heads.

The vase can be any shape, size and be in proportion to the display. There are no marks for the vase. No accessories, or additional foliage will be allowed. Only foliage which is attached naturally to the flowers will be allowed. Packaging material – including floral foam – to keep the stems in place is allowed. The vase will be viewed from all directions.

### Class 123 **Bramley Apple Scones**

For the crumble:

88g Plain Flour

30g Oats

38g Caster Sugar

63g Margarine or Butter

500g Bramley Apples

For the crumble place the plain flour, oats and caster sugar in a bowl. Rub in margarine or butter until resembles bread crumbs.

Peel and dice apples. Preheat oven to 180°C / 350°F / Gas 4

For the scones place self raising flour and margarine or butter in a bowl, using finger tips rub them together to resemble fine bread crumbs then add caster sugar, cinnamon and diced apples – gently mix to combine. Mix 225ml of the milk sparingly into the dry mix, adding more as needed until a soft dough is formed but not too sticky.

Tip the mixture onto a lightly floured surface, using your hands gently knead the dough.

Roll the dough to approx. 4cm thick and cut into 12 equal pieces, re-rolling as needed.

Put the crumble mix onto a tray and dip the top and roll the sides of each scone in the remaining milk and then in the crumble mix. Place scones on a lined baking tray.

Place in the oven for 20-25 minutes or until risen and lightly coloured. Serves 12.

Class 124 **Pear and Ginger Loaf Cake**

200g Unsalted Butter (extra for greasing)

100g Soft Brown Sugar

1tsp Vanilla Extract

1tsp Baking Powder

2 Balls Stem Ginger (in syrup, drained & chopped)

For the glaze:

3tbsp Syrup (from the ginger jar)

100g Caster Sugar

2 Large Eggs – beaten

200g Self Raising Flour

2 Pears (peeled, cored and chopped)

3tbsp Granulated Sugar

Heat oven to 160°C / 320°F / Gas 3. Grease and line the base and sides of a 900g / 2lb loaf tin with baking parchment, ensuring the parchment comes 2cm above the top of the tin.

Beat the butter and sugars together until pale, then gradually stir in the eggs and vanilla extract. Fold the flour, baking powder and a pinch of salt into the mix, then quickly stir through the stem ginger and pears. Pour the mixture into the loaf tin, smooth the surface, then bake for 1 hour – 1 hour 10 mins or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Allow to cool in the tin.

To make the glaze, mix the syrup with 1tsp water and the sugar. Poke the surface of the loaf all over with a skewer, then pour on the syrup. Serve warm with cream or allow to cool completely.

Class 125 **Carrot Cake**

For the cake:

260g Chopped Pecans or Walnuts

100g Granulated Sugar

4 Large Eggs

1tsp Vanilla Extract

2 tsp Baking Powder

½ tsp Salt

1tsp Ginger

260g Grated Carrot

300g Dark Brown Sugar

240ml Vegetable Oil

180g Unsweetened Apple Sauce

300g Plain Flour

1 tsp Baking Soda

1½ tsp Cinnamon

¼ tsp Mixed Spice

For the topping:

452g Cream Cheese

480g Icing Sugar

113g Unsalted Butter

1½tsp Vanilla Extract

Preheat oven to 300°F / 150°C / Gas 2. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and roast nuts for 6-8 mins, remove from oven and cool.

Increase oven to 350°F / 180°C / Gas 4. Grease and line (bottom and sides) of 2 or 3 9” cake tins.

In a large bowl whisk granulated sugar and brown sugar with eggs, apple sauce, vanilla until combined and no lumps.

In another large bowl whisk flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, ginger, mixed spice together. Pour wet ingredients into dry and using a spoon fold them together. Fold in grated carrot and 120g of roasted nuts. Pour batter evenly into cake tins.

Bake in oven till skewer inserted comes out clean. If using 3 tins 20-25 mins or 2 tins 30-35 mins. Cool cakes on a rack for 1 hour then remove from tins.

For the frosting using an electric hand whisk in a large bowl beat the cream cheese and butter together until smooth. Add icing sugar, vanilla and salt. Beat on low speed for 30 seconds, then increase speed until creamy. Use frosting in between cakes and outsides. Decorate with remaining nuts. Refrigerate for 20 minutes before serving.
